4-H Exhibit Handbook

How to use this Handbook

The 4-H exhibit handbook provides the Salt Lake County Fair 4-H schedule of events, 4-H indoor exhibition rules, and 4-H project divisions of competition. The 4-H project divisions are categorized into class and lot. Review the divisions to determine what division, class, and lot your project represents. You will need this information when registering. Also note the rules: only one exhibit per lot within a class. Other rules apply and deadlines exist, so read the rules and schedule carefully.

Eligible 4-H Exhibitors

4-H membership is from grades 3rd through the 12th as of October 1st of the current 4-H year. 4-H members can exhibit projects through the summer following their high school graduation, but not past their 19th birthday. Cloverbuds, K-2nd grades, may exhibit their projects, but are ineligible to compete.

What is a 4-H Club?

A 4-H club is a group of youth members with one or more adult volunteer leaders. The youth develop life skills as they that participate in monthly club meetings, community service projects, citizenship activities, and club outings. The projects completed throughout the year can be demonstrated in county and state contests and exhibited in the county fair.

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Division Rules

1. **Participants must be residents of Salt Lake County and be currently enrolled in Salt Lake County 4-H.**
2. **4-H Age Rule:**
 - 4-H members must have been in the 3rd grade, and at least 8 years old, through the 12th grade on October 1st of the current 4-H year. 4-H Exhibitors can show through the summer following their high school graduation, but not past their 19th birthday.
 - Cloverbuds, kindergarten through 2nd grade, may participate, but not eligible to compete.
3. **Requirements for 4-H Exhibits:**
 - 4-H members must be enrolled in the project in which the exhibit is entered.
 - 4-H members are allowed to enter more than one exhibit per class, but no more than **one exhibit per lot** within the class. Exceptions to this rule are Garden projects and Food Preservation (3 bottles of different fruit and three bottles of different vegetables are allowed).
 - Cloverbuds may enter up to five (5) exhibits. The entries must be labeled Class FD (Introduction to 4-H), regardless of the project item. They receive participation ribbons for each entry.
 - 4-H members are allowed an unlimited number of total entries.
 - All 4-H indoor exhibits must be brought to the fairgrounds for entry on the designated check-in date and time.
4. **Exhibit Judging and Awards:**
 - All entries are judged and given a ribbon, except Cloverbud entries that receive a participation ribbon for each entry.
 - Salt Lake County follows the State 4-H guidelines when judging entries. [Click here](#) to view judging sheets and other State Fair information.
 - Exhibits are rated according to the Danish System:
 - Blue ribbon - Excellent
 - Red ribbon - Good
 - White ribbon – Fair
 - Purple rosette – Best of Show
 - Green ribbon - State Fair Entry
 - Entries deemed to be of *superior quality* are recognized as a State Fair entry and are awarded with a “Best of Show” rosette.
 - Each 4-H member with entries going to the State Fair receives one (1) gate admission pass.
 - Each entry receives a premium, based on the number of 4-H exhibits entered into the fair and funds available.
 - Livestock premiums are paid after pen check-out. No clean up, no premiums.
5. **Special Exhibit Requirements:**
 - Posters must be 22" X 33" or smaller.
 - Notebook binders must be 2 inches or smaller.
 - Displays must be 4' X 4' or smaller and be free-standing.

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Division Rules

- Collection boxes must be 325 square inches for bottom measurement or smaller and glass covers must open at the top or side of the box; the glass must be secured so that glass will not move when the box is properly displayed at the fair.
- Exhibits must have a completed exhibit card attached securely to it. Exhibits with more than one part must have an exhibit card attached to each part numbered 1 of 3, 2 of 3, 3 of 3, etc.
- Food items need to be of a quality to keep more than a week without refrigeration. Frozen food products are not acceptable. Do not send food items which will spoil quickly. Bread exhibits may be made by the traditional method or with a bread machine. Food will be sprayed after judging.
- Exhibits which are normally hung on the wall must provide some means for attachment to the wall (paintings, sketches, framed items, woodworking, wall-hangings, and articles using artificial or dried flowers).
- Exhibits must be well made, so they are stable enough to be moved.
- Baked products and gardening exhibits will not be returned without prior special arrangement.
- Items to be returned (hangers, pie pans, cake stands, etc.) must be marked with name of exhibitor and county.
- Please indicate if the item was made from a kit.
- Projects shouldn't be school homework. If part of it was done in school, please include a note explaining what additional things the 4-H member did to make it also into a 4-H project.

6. Other:

- Salt Lake County 4-H, USU Extension, and Salt Lake County Fair are not responsible for lost, damaged, or stolen entries.
- Salt Lake County 4-H, USU Extension, and Salt Lake County Fair are not responsible for 4-H exhibits not picked up by the deadline. After one month, all remaining entries are either donated to a charitable organization or discarded.

Garden and Food Exhibits in the State Fair:

- As a result of the various growing seasons, fruits, vegetables, and vegetable creatures do not have to compete first at the County Level. However, exhibit entries must be State Level (blue ribbon) quality.
- Food exhibits selected for State Fair entry must be the same food item as exhibited at the County Fair. Prepare the same food item and return the item to the Salt Lake County 4-H office on the specified State exhibit due date and time.

DIVISION A - CITIZENSHIP/CIVIC EDUCATION

CLASS AB - CITIZENSHIP

Note: for Community Service see class AG: Volunteerism, Service Learning & Community Service.

- Lot 1: Poster or other display item on how government works (ie legislative process, etc.)
- Lot 2: Poster or other display item that compares government in different countries.
- Lot 3: Citizenship Game – can include but is not limited to flash cards, question and answer board, etc. Include instruction on how to play the game.
- Lot 4: Patriotic display – poster or other display item promoting patriotism.
- Lot 5: Other item related to Citizenship not listed above.

CLASS AC - CULTURAL EDUCATION

Exhibit should show an emphasis on its relationship to heritage. The project may focus on a particular time period, a particular place or an individual family or person.

- Lot 1: Genealogy report of your family.
- Lot 2: Family tree – painted, cross-stitched, etc.
- Lot 3: Poster or other display item about a family ancestor(s) or family birthplace.
- Lot 4: Collection of family recipes – should include at least 10 recipes
- Lot 5: Quilt, painting, craft or other artwork depicting family's heritage.
- Lot 6: Collection of photographs, mounted and identified, depicting your family history.
- Lot 7: Heritage craft accompanied by report of its history.
- Lot 8: Games and toys of earlier days.
- Lot 9: Poster or other display item of a 4-H exchange (intrastate, interstate)
- Lot 10: Other item related to Cultural Education not listed above.

CLASS AD - GLOBAL EDUCATION

Exhibit on world issues studied in the project.

- Lot 1: Poster or other display item that traces family roots to other countries.
- Lot 2: Poster or other display item that compares different cultures (food/nutrition, names, lifestyle, clothing, economics, education, etc.)
- Lot 3: Collection of items from one country, minimum of six items, with an explanation of how each item provides a greater understanding of the culture studied.
- Lot 4: Other item related to Global Education not listed above.

CLASS AE - INTERGENERATIONAL PROGRAMMING

- Lot 1: Poster, scrapbook or other display item of your involvement in the Adopt a Grandparent program.
- Lot 2: Poster or other display item that explains the aging process and healthy living.
- Lot 3: Other item related to Intergenerational Programming not listed above.

CLASS AF - UNDERSTANDING PHYSICAL AND MENTAL LIMITATIONS

- Lot 1: Poster, notebook or other display item explaining a specific physical or mental disability.
- Lot 2: Poster or other display item of your involvement with an individual(s) with a physical or mental disability.
- Lot 3: Other item related to Understanding Physical and Mental Limitations not listed above.

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Division – Class – Lot

CLASS AG – VOLUNTEERISM, SERVICE LEARNING, AND COMMUNITY SERVICE (Projects for AH and AI should be entered here)

- Lot 1: Poster or other display item of your 4-H volunteer project, either individually or with your 4-H club, and its impact on you and your community.
- Lot 2: Poster or other display item of the impact of volunteerism.
- Lot 3: Care Package Display – poster or item about process of making a care package and delivering it. Should not include actual care package.
- Lot 4: Other item related to Volunteerism, Service Learning, and Community Service not listed above.

DIVISION B - COMMUNICATIONS AND EXPRESSIVE ARTS

CLASS BA - COMMUNICATION ARTS

- Lot 1: Speech written, performed, recorded on video tape if possible.
- Lot 2: Demonstration given, recorded on video tape if possible.
- Lot 3: Original poems
- Lot 4: Original stories
- Lot 5: Other item related to Communication Arts not listed above.

CLASS BB - PERFORMING ARTS

- Lot 1: Magic/Clowning/Mime - Poster, notebook or other display item of what was learned through a magic, clowning, or mime project. (ie video of magic show performed, portfolio of tricks learned, collection of jokes, etc.)
- Lot 2: Dance - Poster, notebook or other display item of what was learned through 4-H dance project (ie dance steps learned, video of original dance performed, etc)
- Lot 3: Theatrical writings - Original writings - script or screen play
- Lot 4: Music/Vocal/Sound – Poster, notebook or other display item of what was learned through 4-H vocal or instrumental music project. (ie. Original music score with cassette taped music, musical instrument created by member, etc)
- Lot 5: Acting/Directing - Poster, notebook or other display item of what was learned through 4-H theatre arts project. (ie dvd of acting done with written narration about the piece, recording of a monologue with copy of script, etc)
- Lot 6: Stage craft - Poster, notebook or other display item of what was learned through 4-H theatre arts project (ie set design model, display of props created by 4-H member, display of makeup, costume made by member, illustrations of costume design, etc)
- Lot 7: Puppetry - Poster, notebook or other display item of what was learned through puppetry project (ie collection of puppets made by member, dvd of puppet show performed, etc)

CLASS BCA - ARTS AND CRAFTS

Jewelry and smaller crafts should be attached to a 3x5 card

- Lot 1: Boondoggle – item made primarily of boondoggle – ie keychain, figure, etc.
- Lot 2: Metal – decoration, wall hanging, or other item cut out of metal
- Lot 3: Tile Pictures (*Painted wood signs should be entered in Lot 15 (judged on painting) or 16 (judged on lettering)*)
- Lot 4: Painted wood crafts – wall hanging, basket, frame, tole painted or other item.
- Lot 5: Vinyl lettering – wall hangings, pictures, or other item

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Division – Class – Lot

- Lot 6: Wax crafts – candles or other items made of wax.
Lot 7: Duct tape – item is made mainly of duct tape – sword, wallet, etc..
Lot 8: Personal care items– soap, lip balm, lotion, fizz balls, or other item.
Lot 9: Lego, model cars, – lego's, k'nex, etc.
Lot11: Other – any item that does not fit into the above categories or any of the categories BCAB through BCAW below.

CLASS BCAB - BEADING

*Smaller crafts should be attached to a 3x5 card-**Jewelry should be entered in Class BCAJ***

- Lot 1: Seed beads – (ie jewelry bead) fabric, hair accessory, or other item.
Lot 2: Pony beads – (craft beads) – animals (geckos), keychains, or other item
Lot 3: Melted beads – (melted in oven or with iron) suncatchers, other items

CLASS BCAC – CERAMICS

- Lot 1: Painted ceramics – medium to large figure or group of small figures
Lot 2: Stained or glazed ceramics - medium to large figure or group of small figures

CLASS BCAD - PORCELAIN

- Lot 1: Clothed dolls
Lot 2: Other porcelain item not listed above (egg, ornament, etc)

CLASS BCAF – FLOWER ARRANGING

- Lot 1: Dried flowers – picture, basket, wreath or other item decorated with dried flowers
Lot 2: Artificial flowers – flower arrangement, picture or other item decorated with artificial flowers

CLASS BCAJ – JEWELRY - necklace, bracelet, ring, earrings, or other type of jewelry

- Lot 1: Seed Bead Jewelry (tiny beads)
Lot 2: Glass Bead Jewelry
Lot 3: Wood Bead Jewelry
Lot 4: Metal Bead Jewelry
Lot 5: Porcelain Bead Jewelry
Lot 6: Other Bead Jewelry
Lot 7: Wire Jewelry
Lot 8: String Jewelry – jewelry made using only string (ie knotted)

CLASS BCAL – LEATHER CRAFT

- Lot 1: Carving or Stamping - belt, keychain, or other item that has been stamped or carved
Lot 2: Stitching – wallet, purse, or other item that has been hand stitched and stamped

CLASS BCAP – PAPER CRAFT

- Lot 1: Stationary – cards, stationary paper, envelopes
Lot 2: Origami, Paper dolls
Lot 3: Scrapbooking – Scrapbook or scrapbook pages
Lot 4: Other paper craft – All other item made primarily of paper that does not fit in lots 1-3

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Division – Class – Lot

CLASS BCAR – FABRIC CRAFT

Lot 1: Fabric craft - doll, wreath, basket, wall hanging, or other *non-clothing and/or non-sewn* item mostly made from fabric. *(All sewn items and/or clothing items, including flipflops, should go under CB (non-sewn) or CBA (sewn))*

CLASS BCAS - STENCILING

Lot 1: Project using stenciling techniques. (ie. sign, wall hanging, dishtowel, article of clothing, etc.)

CLASS BCAV – PLASTIC CANVAS

Lot 1: Decoration, picture frame, basket or other item created with plastic canvas

CLASS BCAW – WOOD CARVING / ENGRAVING / BURNING *(Other wood projects should be entered in HCH)*

Lot 1: Item made from carved wood (car, boat, walking stick, frame, etc)

Lot 2: Wooden item that has been engraved (jewelry box, sign, etc)

Lot 3: Wooden item that has been burned (jewelry box, wall hanging, etc.)

CLASS BCB - DRAWING, PAINTING, SCULPTURE

Work of art utilizing one of the following mediums. If using more than one medium, please indicate under which lot it is to be judged.

- Lot 1: Lead pencil drawing/sketching
- Lot 2: Colored pencil drawing/sketching
- Lot 3: Charcoal drawing/sketching
- Lot 4: Pastel drawing/sketching
- Lot 5: Crayon drawing/sketching
- Lot 6: Chalk drawing/sketching
- Lot 7: Mixed media drawing/sketching
- Lot 8: Calligraphy
- Lot 9: Oil painting - (using a brush to apply medium.)
- Lot 10: Watercolor painting
- Lot 11: Acrylic painting
- Lot 12: Sculpture – pottery
- Lot 13: Clay sculpture
- Lot 14: Other – fine arts not listed above

CLASS BCC - GRAPHIC ARTS, DISPLAYS, EXHIBITS

Work of art created utilizing computer technology. Can be a greeting card, business card, menu, cd cover, book layout, newsletter, or other piece.

- Lot 1: Full color
- Lot 2: Black and white

CLASS BCD – CONVENTIONAL PHOTOGRAPHY

All photography should be mounted or framed.

- Lot 1: One photo album page attractively displaying **photos taken by you** in your project. (Judging will be on the photos, not on the scrapbooking.)
- Lot 2: A photo story. About 5 to 10 black and white or color pictures which depict a simple story.

An enlarged 4x6, 5x7 or 8x10 mounted and titled color or black and white photograph.

- Lot 3: Landscape – color
- Lot 4: Landscape – black and white
- Lot 5: Person Portrait
- Lot 6: Animal Wildlife
- Lot 7: Animal Pets
- Lot 8: Sports/Action
- Lot 9: Human Interest
- Lot 10: Macro/Close-up
- Lot 11: Nature
- Lot 12: Architecture
- Lot 13: Abstract
- Lot 14: 4-H Promotional Photo (projects, community service, activities/events)
- Lot 15: Conventional photo using adjustable focus and or adjustable exposure – negative must be included
- Lot 16: Digitally Altered or Enhanced Photo – should include original photo for comparison
- Lot 17: Other - a photography item that is NOT mentioned in the Photography classes above. Items might include video, movie making, animation, color enhancement, etc.

DIVISION C - CONSUMER AND FAMILY SCIENCE

CLASS CA - CHILD DEVELOPMENT, CHILD CARE, BABYSITTING

- Lot 1: **Child Development** exhibits include, but are not limited to:
- Poster or collage of ages and stages of child development.
 - Display of age appropriate or safety of toys and games.
 - Display of first aid concepts.
 - Notebook of healthy snacks for kids.
 - Notebook of television programming evaluation.
 - Chart of your roles, responsibilities and actions.
 - Poster of problem situations and solutions.
 - Other items related to child development not listed above.

Child Care / Baby Sitting exhibits include:

- Lot 2: A toy handmade by the 4-H member.
- Lot 3: A puppet handmade by the 4-H member with an accompanying original story (neatly printed in ink or typed) to be used with puppet, both submitted in a sealed plastic bag.
- Lot 4: An original story with accompanying flannel board characters handmade by the 4-H member (submit the story and characters in a sealed plastic bag, do not include flannel board in exhibit).
- Lot 5: A baby sitter's kit (contained in a suitcase, sturdy box or draw string bag) containing at least eight involvement items for young children, four of which must be handmade by the 4-H member, the

- remaining may be commercial products.
- Lot 6: A quiet book handmade by the 4-H member with a minimum of 7 different activities for young children to do in a quiet situation, at least two pages must be created by the 4-H member, not copied from a commercial pattern.
- Lot 7: Other item created to be used in the care of a child.

CLASS CB - CLOTHING and TEXTILES

- Lot 1: Decorate Your Duds – Embellished Garment - jeans, jackets, t-shirts, vests, shorts, or any clothing article decorated creatively with appliqué, lace, buttons, bows or other items, accessories such as hats, shoes and jewelry may be included.
- Lot 2: Decorate Your Duds – Fabric Altered Garment - fabric is tie-dyed, sun-dyed, painted, pieced, or otherwise altered while creating garment.
- Lot 3: Fabric Swatches or items using fabric designed by the artist. The textile design can be done on clothing blanks, or other fiber. Includes items created using sun printing, dying, stamping, batik, printing on fabric, stamping on velvet, transfers, or other surface design.
- Lot 4: Poster, notebook or other display item on careers available in the field of apparel and textiles. This could include careers related to apparel or textile design, textile finishes, research in standardizing ready-to-wear, visual merchandising, fashion forecasting, apparel production, etc.
- Lot 5: Item produced using technology. (ie. item embellished with computerized machine embroidery, apparel designed/ constructed using a computer-generated pattern, printout of a textile design created using technology.)
- Lot 6: Sewing for Income - submit a notebook or poster telling about your project. May include pictures of items produced.
- Lot 7: Poster, notebook or other display item related to textiles (ie. types of fabric construction; results of burn test fiber identification; stain removal exhibit; collection of fabric samples identified by fiber content, trade name, care recommendations, common uses, etc.)
- Lot 8: Service Project – (For general service projects, see Class AG.) May included a variety of textile items as part of a service sewing project, including but not limited to: toys, blankets, caps, mittens, and clothing items. Include a brief description of the service project – this may be done on a 3x5 index card, or of a length no longer than one page, attached to the item(s).
- Lot 9: Other non-sewn Creative Textile items not listed above - includes non-sewn fleece projects.

CLASS CBA - SEWING CONSTRUCTION

- Lot 1: Pillowcase
- Lot 2: Pillow
- Lot 3: Drawstring Bag/Camp Bag
- Lot 4: Backpack, Duffel Bag, Fanny Pack, Handbag
- Lot 5: Apron
- Lot 6: Clothing Remade – garment must be cut into or taken apart in some way in the “redesign” process – ie: skirt made of levi pants, etc. May include before and after picture.
- Lot 7: Shorts, Capris, Pants – with casing – elastic or drawstring waistband
- Lot 8: Shorts, Capris, Pants – with waistband or facing
- Lot 9: Skirt – with casing – elastic or drawstring waistband
- Lot 10: Skirt – with waistband or facing
- Lot 11: Vest
- Lot 12: Pajama Set, Nightgown, Robe or Loungewear (Single pajama pants should be entered in lot 7)
- Lot 13: Jumper
- Lot 14: Shirt/Blouse

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Division – Class – Lot

- Lot 15: Casual Dress
- Lot 16: Coat, Jacket or Outerwear
- Lot 17: Multi-piece Outfit (2 or 3 piece, not tailored) – t-shirt and pants,
- Lot 18: Special Occasion Dress / Formal or Evening Wear
- Lot 19: Tailoring (2 or 3 piece outfit)
- Lot 20: Action Wear (using stretchable fabrics) – swimsuits, leotards, lingerie, biking shorts and shirts.
- Lot 21: Create Your Own Fabric—clothing, home decorations, gifts, wall hangings, accessories, or whatever you choose to make with the fabric you have created.
- Lot 22: Sewing for Animals—aprons, saddlebags, tool carriers, cloth carriers, garment bags, hat tote, rope and boot bags, hay and feed bags, pads or beds, animal coats, bird cage covers, leg wraps, tail wraps, saddle blankets, chaps, dusters, etc.
- Lot 23: Soft Sculpture—stuffed doll, animal, or other figure utilizing soft sculpture techniques
- Lot 24: Sewn Fleece Projects – Any item constructed from fleece. Exhibits may include: mittens, hats, outerwear, blankets, pillows, boas, etc. (*Non-sewn fleece projects should be entered under CB 9*)
- Lot 25: Sewing for dolls – any article of sewn clothing made for a doll
- Lot 26: Other creative sewn textile item

CLASS CBB - WARDROBE MANAGEMENT

- Lot 1: Poster or other display item analyzing three or more clothing advertisements.
- Lot 2: Comparison shopping summary.
- Lot 3: Poster, notebook or other display item of wardrobe analysis and plan.
- Lot 4: Poster or other display item of clothing trends.
- Lot 5: Poster, notebook or other display item about careers in the fashion industry.
- Lot 6: Other item related to Wardrobe Management not listed above.

CLASS CBC - MODELING

- Lot 1: Personal color chart and figure type analysis.
- Lot 2: Design of a Fashion Show.
- Lot 3: Other item related to Modeling not listed above.

CLASS CBD – QUILTING

*50% of quilt should be made by the exhibitor. Please include card explaining your quilting (ie. Did you piece it, quilt it, someone else quilt it, etc). It is customary to piece the quilt and have assistance with quilting. Regardless of size of quilt, it will be judged on skills utilized. ****Pillowcases should be entered in CBA Lot 1***

- Lot 1: Tied quilts/pieced.
- Lot 2: Tied quilt/whole
- Lot 3: Rag quilts.
- Lot 4: Pieced quilts, machine quilted.
- Lot 5: Pieced quilts, hand quilted
- Lot 6: Appliquéd quilts, machine quilted
- Lot 7: Appliquéd quilts, hand quilted
- Lot 8: Wall hangings
- Lot 9: Other item related to Quilting not listed above – quillow, etc..

CLASS CBE - KNITTING

- Lot 1: Kitchen Items – potholders, dishcloths, towel tops, scrubbies, etc
- Lot 2: Baby Items – dress, booties
- Lot 3: Dolls, doll clothes, toys

 - a) Name of exhibitor.
 - b) Name of recipe/source of recipe, i.e. USDA, Kerr, Ball, or pectin brand name.
 - c) Date canned.
 - d) Processing method and time - water bath, pressure canner, using correct altitude adjustments for your area.

At least 100 of the insects must have been collected during the current year. A life history display of 1 insect species with complete metamorphosis and 1 insect with incomplete metamorphosis must be included.
Lot 6: Unit V - Up to two boxes of insects containing at least 50 insects properly labeled as to state, locality, date, and collector and grouped by family (at least 25 families identified and labeled).

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- Lot 7: Unit VI - Up to two boxes of insects containing 100 insects properly labeled as to state, locality, date, and collector and grouped by family (at least 50 families identified and labeled).
- Lot 8: Special individual exhibit - Individual exhibit open to any age qualified to enter the State Fair as a second display or as an advanced entomology unit project. Displays can not have been previously exhibited at the State Fair.
- Lot 9: Insect educational display - illustrate principles of entomology such as: where insects live, what insects eat, insect growth and development, etc. Displays may include areas of beekeeping, ant farms, insect damage, IPM projects or any other special project.
